Developments in loan and deposit markets in July 2021

Loans market


In July 2021, new loans extended¹ by banks totaled MDL 4,415.3 million, recording an increase of 36.1 % compared to July 2020.

The structure of loans granted (Chart 1) in the reporting month evolved as follows:

- 73.3% represent loans extended in domestic currency, which totaled MDL 3,237.3 million (+10.6 % compared to the previous month and +38.2 % compared to July 2020);
- 25.3% represent loans extended in foreign currency, which, recalculated in MDL, totaled MDL 1,118.6 million (+13.4% compared to the previous month and +36.9% compared to July 2020);
- 1.4% represent foreign-currency-linked² loans, which amounted MDL 59.5 million lei (-18.2% compared to previous month and -30.8% compared to July 2020).

Dynamics of new loans extended, million MDL (upper chart) and the annual growth rate of new loans extended by banks, % (lower chart)



In terms of maturity (Chart 2), loans with maturity ranging from 2 to 5 years recorded the highest demand of 52.2% of total extended loans. Businesses hold 33.1% of these loans.

New loans extended by maturity and their structure, %





Domestic currency loans (Chart 3) were mainly represented by loans extended to individuals (46.7%) and to non-financial commercial companies (47.2%). Within loans to non-financial commercial companies, loans to trade dominated (48.6%).

Foreign currency loans were mainly requested by non-financial commercial companies (96.4%), and the largest share (67.2%) belongs to trade.

The average interest rate on new loans extended in domestic currency constituted 6.88%, on loans in foreign currency - 3.90%, and on foreign-currency-linked loans - 3.82%.


Compared to the previous month, the average rate evolved as follows (Chart 4):

- on domestic currency loans it increased by 0.10 percentage points (p.p.). Businesses received their loans at an average rate of 8.06%, individuals performing an activity³ - at a rate of 8.11%, while individuals - at a rate of 5.55%;
- on foreign currency loans it decreased by 0.20 p.p. Businesses received their loans at an average rate of 3.90%, individuals performing an activity - at a rate of 5.64%, while individuals - at a rate of 6.74%;
- on foreign-currency-linked loans it decreased by 0.12 p.p. Businesses received their loans at an average rate of 3.61% and individuals - at a rate of 4.87%. Individuals performing an activity did not apply for this type of credit.

Compared to the similar period of the previous year, the interest rate on domestic currency loans decreased by 1.12 p.p., on those in foreign currency by 0.18 p.p., and on foreign-currency-linked loans - by 0.91 p.p.

Weighted average interest rates on new loans, %



The volume of domestic currency loans extended to individuals increased in July 2021 by 5.4% as compared to the previous month and totaled MDL 1,512.2 million (Chart 5). The average rate on these loans increased by 0.05 p.p.

From the perspective of the purpose of newly extended loans, consumer loans held the largest share (65.0%), and were extended with an average rate of 4.80% (-0.04 p.p. compared to the previous month and -2.31 p.p. compared to July 2020).

The average rate on mortgage loans increased by 0.28 p.p. compared to the previous month and decreased by 0.02 p.p. compared to July 2020.


It should be noted, that 98.3% of total mortgage loans were extended in domestic currency. Consumer loans, also, were mainly extended in domestic currency (99.9% of total consumer loans).

Domestic currency loans (Chart 6) with maturity from 2 to 5 years, recording the highest demand, were extended at an average interest rate of 6.48% (8.28% on businesses loans, 8.00% on loans of individuals performing an activity, and 4.56%

on individuals' loans).

The highest average rate on domestic currency loans was registered on loans with maturity up to 1 month, and amounted 9.52% (businesses loans - 9.52%, individuals' loans - 9.45%, while individuals performing an activity did not apply for loans with this term).


Loans in foreign currency with terms of 2 to 5 years (which had the highest volume in the reporting month) were extended with an average rate of 3.96% (businesses loans - 3.96%, the loans of individuals performing an activity - 4.25%, individuals' loans - 6.83% (Chart 6)).

Deposits market

In July 2021, the new term deposits totaled MDL 2,532.2 million, increasing by 11.4% compared to July 2020 (Chart 7).

The volume of new term deposits constituted:


- in domestic currency – MDL 1,504.6 million (+1.0% compared to the previous month and +3.0% compared to July 2020);
- in foreign currency, recalculated in MDL – MDL 1,027.5 million (+38.7% compared to the previous month and +26.4% compared to July 2020).

The share of deposits attracted in the domestic currency constituted 59.4%, of those in foreign currency – 40.6%.

Individuals' deposits (Chart 8) represented the largest share of total deposits – 73.0% (where 38.1% represent domestic currency deposits and 34.9% - foreign currency deposits).

New term deposits placed by maturity and their structure, %





In terms of maturity, the highest demand was recorded for deposits with terms from 2 to 5 years, which held 39.0% of total term deposits (29.8% - individuals' deposits).

The average interest rate on domestic currency term deposits constituted 3.15%, and on those in foreign currency - 0.49%.

Compared to the previous month, the average rate evolved as follows:


- on domestic currency deposits it decreased by 0.03 p.p. Businesses placed their deposits at an average rate of 2.36%, individuals performing an activity – at a rate of 1.50%, while individuals – at a rate of 3.59%;
- on foreign currency deposits it decreased by 0.01 p.p. Businesses placed their deposits at an average rate of 0.38% and individuals – at a rate of 0.51%. Individuals performing an activity did not place any foreign currency deposits.

Compared to July 2020, the average interest rate on domestic currency deposits decreased as well as that on foreign currency deposits (Chart 9).

Domestic currency deposits with maturity from 6 to 12 months, which recorded the highest demand in the reporting period, were attracted at an average interest rate of 3.37% (businesses deposits – at a rate of 3.03%, deposits of individuals practicing activity - at a rate of 1.50, while individuals’ deposits – at a rate of 3.49% (Chart 10).

In the case of foreign currency deposits, the most attractive are being those with terms from 2 to 5 years, which were placed at an average interest rate of 0.54% (businesses placed their deposits at a rate of 0.45%, and individuals – at a rate of 0.56%).

The highest average rate on domestic currency deposits was recorded as follows:

- on businesses deposits with terms from 1 to 2 years (3.25%);
- on deposits of individuals performing activity - from 1 to 3 months (1.50%);
- on individuals’ deposits - over 5 years (4.74%).

The highest average rate on foreign currency deposits was recorded as follows:


- on businesses deposits with terms from 1 to 2 years (1.00%);
- on individuals’ deposits with terms over 5 years (1.72%).

Interest rate margin on domestic currency transactions constituted 3.74 p.p., while on those in foreign currency amounted – 3.41 p.p.



The interest rate margin on domestic currency transactions increased by 0.13 p.p. compared to the previous month and decreased by 0.45 p.p. compared to July 2020 (Chart 11).

The interest margin on foreign currency transactions decreased by 0.19 p.p. compared to the previous month and increased by 0.14 p.p. compared to July 2020.
